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## Last month at a glance

Mice, Mice and more Mice. Well that's how things started last month and its continued right through June. Everybody has been busy throughout the month checking traps and tracking cards for the elusive pests.

The second tracking card run indicated we had been successful in clearing the the top areas of West and Menzie blocks but still had a problem in the Public area and up into the lower end of Crawshaw and O'Connors blocks. This is still a work in progress.

Again corporate working bees have been a huge help with tasks around the reserve. Crews from Monkeytoe helped on two occasions this month.

The new entry gate controllers continue to give problems. Hopefully the contractors can kick these gremlins to touch quickly to allow staff some piece of mind.

The first round of the annual kiwi call counts have been completed. The call rate was a little down on last year with 24 pairs being identified. Another round will be held in July.

Trapping is soon to start in Rannoch's Bush, the new corridor area connecting Rotokare to the Totara Block. This is hoped to provide an area of safe passage for bird life to move between the two predator free areas.

Finally congratulations to the Trustees for the recognition of their effort in driving the Rotokare Scenic Reserve forward with the award they received at the New Plymouth Volunteer Awards.
